

前 言

近几年来,高职院校紧跟教育改革步伐,不断更新教学理念,英语教学水平有了显著提高,但是,就英语口语课程来说,教学效果还不十分令人满意。目前,高校英语口语教材并不匮乏,然而适合高职高专院校的英语口语教材并不多见。上课时学生常常感到无话可说,其中原因之一是教材偏重机械性操练,语言缺乏情感交流;原因之二是教材的内容和方向与学生要求有距离,不能完全满足学生的学习目的。

基于目前高职院校英语口语教学中存在的种种问题,我们成立了《英语口语教程》课题编写组。经过长期的资料收集和整理工作,针对高职院校教学培养目标,本教材编写组成人员几次易稿,终于于2008年底完成了本教程的编写工作。

本教程具有以下几个方面的特点:

- 1. 教材难易程度得当。本教材由低点开始,浅中有深,适用面广,既可当作正规教材供专科学校教学使用,也可当做自学教材供社会上英语口语学习者使用。
- 2. 教材内容实用性强。针对高职院校"实用性"、"复合型"人才的培养目标,对材料的选择、对话的编排、情景和功能训练均作了针对性安排,尽量满足了人才培养方案要求。
- 3. 语言与文化学习相交融。本教材在编写过程中注重语言能力的学习,立足交际功能的培养,融文化学习与语言交际于教学之中,强化学生综合素质的提高。
- 4. 具有创新意识。在传统教材单一口语模式的教学内容基础上,本教材增加了篇章朗读。所选文章均出自英美原文或名人演讲稿,语言文字表达正确,思想内容积极向上,不仅拓宽了学生的知识面,也使英语口语训练上升了一个台阶。
- 5. 附带参考答案。每个单元学习内容后都跟着一定量的练习,不仅可以帮助学生巩固学习内容,也可以使学习者进行自我学习效果的检测,有利于学习者进行自我学习和自我测评。

本书由鸡西大学邵华,七台河职业学院刘晓红、孙建国担任主编;由鸡西大学汪艳担任副主编。编写分工如下:邵华编写了1~6单元及附录第一部分(10.8万字);刘晓红编写了7~12单元及附录第二部分(10.3万字);孙建国编写了13~17单元及附录第三部分(10万字)。全书由邵华统稿。

本书编写过程中得到了广大同仁热情鼓励和帮助,并提出了宝贵的修改意见,在此一并表示感谢。由于作者水平有限,不足之处在所难免,欢迎读者批评指正。

Cultural Notes

- 1. Greetings are very important since they contribute to the first impression with the people get of you. They also provide opportunities to impress people with your personality and manners. In the U. S. A., you can even call a person by their first name you meet them. It is not impolite, but show you are nice and easy going.
- 2. Under normal circumstances, in western countries people like to introduce young people to the elders, to introduce the younger generation to the older one, to introduce the lower level ones to higher authorities, to introduce men to women to show courtesy and respect.
- 3. Greetings in an informal situation, especially among young people they'd like to head when people meet
- 4. In the west, when two people first meet and are getting acquainted with each other, it is common to talk about one's work, aspects of one's social identity, including education, employment experience, technical and general knowlege, personal interests, routine activities, likes and dislikes, and leisure time activities. It is accetable to ask how old small children are, but it is not normal to ask how old adults are.

Section B A Passage for Reading Aloud

Reaching the Top of the Mountain

"You can always see a beautiful sky at the top of the mountain, but you can't see it before you reach the top."

Whenever the sun dropped and the blue sky camp up, my father and I used to climb the mountain near my house. Walking togher, my father and I used to have a lot of conversations through which I learned lessons from his experiences. He always stressed to me, "You should have objectives and capacity like the mountain."

This has largely influenced my life. Without the mountain – climbing that we both enjoyed, we couldn't have had enough time to spend together because my father was very busy. I believe mountaineering is really beneficial. It gave me time to talk with my father and to be in deep contemplation as well as develop my patience. I loved scaling mountains, to get away from noise and pollution of the city, and breathe the fresh air.

One time we climbed a very high mountain. It was so challenging for me because I was only ten years old. During the first few hours of climbing, I enjoyed the fresh air, the birds' singing, and the beautiful dances of butterflies; but as time passed, I got a pain in both my legs. At that moment, I wanted to quit climbing. Actually, I hated it at that moment, but my father said to me, "Spring is a season when everything comes to life again. The mountain and fields where we are standing are embroidered with flowers and trees. You can always see a beautiful sky at the top of the mountain, but you can't see it before you reach the top. You can always enjoy the scenes of the waterfalls and countless peaks and valleys at the top of the mountain, but you can't when you are halfway up. Only there at the top, can you embrace all of those things, just like in life."

At that time, I was too young to understand his thoughts, but after that, I got new hope and confidence. Finally, I found myself standing at the top of the mountain. And there, I could see the whole of the sky, which was as clear as crystal.
