

Staff — Read letter from Mr. Cherquell applying for

Works

New Road to run at the back of Professors from Mankham Road near Miller and Bath's bungalows to Alpha Street.

Read letter from Mr McLean (No 1651) conveying on behalf of himself and Messrs Bell & Meritland the conditions on which they are prepared to give this road at the back of their properties - Requiring as these Gentlemen do amongst other things that the road along the creek in front of their land should be given up to them - The Meeting regret it is out of their power to carry out this new road with this condition attached. They decide to act independently and instruct Mr Barnes Dallas to arrange the best line he can.

Docks or Creek by Mankham Road - It is suggested that some attempts should be made to stop further damage to the Mankham Road by the shooting of some rubble into the Creek or the construction of a small Breakwater.

Hougtong Road, extension from Doghouse to Keangoe Roads -

Mr McHillip having failed up to date to carry out the arrangement entered into with Mr Hudson, Executor to the estate of the late James Hooper in 1873, the Secretary is instructed to call upon Mr Hudson to fulfil his part of the agreement without delay and failing his doing so to place the matter in the hands of the legal adviser.

Mankham Road extension to Jessfield Road - In reply to a question from a member, the Chairman states that the only recompensation Mr Dallas expects for his services for carrying this road throughout is the usual commissio on the value of the land purchased.

Roads: Further powers for improving - Read letter No 73 from legal Adviser's stating it to be their opinion that "the only means by which the objects the Council have in view can be effected, are the financing and passing, if possible of a Local Regulation which should give to the Council for the time being the power of compelling under certain circumstances the surrender of the

"said received - The matter is, in our view of the
"case, too important a one to be effected by a Bye
"law and if Compulsory surrender were not a
"main point in the proposed regulations we do not
"see how any action which the Council might be
"authorized to take in cases of this description
"could be enforced or followed up - In the present
"framing of the proposed Regulation it would probably
"be found advisable to word it as to make the cases
"in which Compulsory surrender would be compelled
"by Bye-laws, and as the Regulations would have
"to be passed by a Special meeting of Rate-payers before
"being sent to the King for official sanction, it would
"be desirable to ascertain how far the Rate-payers and
"Land Owners would be likely to agree in authorizing
"the proposed measure."

Works

Stonecutter's Road extension from Shek Kip Mei to Kowloon Roads.

(25th) Received letter from Mr. Maclellan, asking the Council to reconsider their decision with regard to his claim for Pounds 1000. The matter is left in the hands of the Works Committee.

Stonecutter's Young King Street and Defence Creek. (Read letter No.

from Beach Council conveying their decision not to entertain the project further, owing to the expense which their engineer reports would be entailed in carrying it out. The matter requires further consideration at the hands of this Council, but it being so near the end of their year of office they determined to leave it to the incoming Council to be finally dealt with.

Upper Stonecutter's Road extension from Broadway to Second Road.

The Chairman states that the owner of lot 246a was about to build a number of Chinese houses in the immediate line of this road, but now willing to consider a reasonable offer for any of the land required by the Public for a road. He had consented to delay operations for a fortnight pending consideration of the matter by the Council. The Works Committee recommended the road being made if the owner, reported to be Yang Tsien-Chung, would accept compensation at the appecd rate per mow - as at present there was no thoroughfare from Broadway to the proposed Second Road between the Stonecutter's Road and Young King Road, a distance of about four thousand feet, and the present seemed a favourable opportunity to them of opening up a crowded and dirty locality. A plan is laid on the table showing the line of a 25 foot road and the properties it passes. There being some doubt as to whether the portion of this road at present formed had been surrendered to the Municipality, the Council asked to be furnished with more information on this point before coming to a decision.

New Road from Honour St. to Shantung Rd., between the Canton and Southwicks Roads. - Read letter from Mr. Kingwill stating that it was the intention of the lessor of lot 1779 to leave a private road 23 feet, and if the Council wished it to be 28 feet instead of 23 ft. he was willing to make it so, provided the Council would make up, drain and light the thoroughfare. - The Council are not disposed to go to the expense involved, some £acs. 6,200/- without getting an absolute surrender of the road.

Southwicks road.

Shantung Road. } The gate and fence, etc. proposed by Mr. Kingwill in the same letter, as per plan enclosed thereto, were agreed to.

Vindegot. Resolved that Mr. Clark continue to Act as Surveyor
Walch.

The Superintendent of Police was sent for to give some information, relative to a statement made in the British Consulate, that a drunken sailor taken out of the water had been allowed to remain in his wet clothes, in the Police cell, during the night and had been beaten by the Guard in them the next morning. Mr. Penfold stated this was not the case. The Sailor referred to, had on his arrival at the Station, been given dry clothes to sleep in, and his own were dried. In the morning he put on his own clothes again, by some neglect on the part of the Sergeant on duty the sailor's great coat had not been properly dried and he was allowed to go to Court in it. The Sergeant has been reprimanded.

Lock Hospital. At the same time Mr. Penfold stated that the women objected and would not submit voluntarily to vaccination, and had closed their houses.

Opposite Road, extension from Broadway to Seward Road. - The
 Chairman states that so far as the Board's Committee have
 been able to discover since last meeting, the only persons
 to treat with for the ground were M^r. Jardine Matheson
 & Co. & Thorpe and Mr. ^{Son} G. Smith, it was estimated that if
 the assessed rate per acre were paid a 25 feet road
 would cost £ 890.
 a 30 feet road £ 1750.

The Council consider the improvement too costly - it
 was not absolutely required, and as the Council in
 1872 had guaranteed to carry through a road only
 200 feet off. For another reason that owners of property
 adjacent gave assuring and directed all the advertising
 of the proposed road. The Board reluctantly determine
 not to consider it further --

The owners of land, whose property would be improved by the extension of the High-Foungate might come forward and assist the Council rather than see it fall through on the score of cost, and they had better be informed of the Council's decision.

The Road by the ^{side of the} River is to be pushed on to the Leward road, and deflected at the Foss House, which had been built in the line, if necessary,-

Mr Collier, who had been called in to authorize filling up the ditch, and negotiate for any land wanted to complete the road.

Houghton Police Station. - The Chairman states, Mr. Buddle's property, Register Office in H.S. Consulate, referred to at last meeting must be bought under Deeds 25,000/- offers of ground to be invited in a Charity news.

Roads. New Road. From Broadway to Seward Road past site of

Gazometer. — The Surveyor attends and states that he had arranged with the Depoee for land at \$200 per acre and that he considered the matter as settled; - at the same time a foreigner was endeavouring to get the land by offering a better price than the Council, and the Country people might not sell at \$200 -

Chickiang Road Extension Hinkiang Rd. to Hankow Road, and
Hankow Road to Foochow Road.

Chairman states that Mr. E. J. Hogg had not yet received any reply from England regarding the proposal made by the Council in October last (4th Oct. 76.) -

Building Regulations. Reference is again made to this subject and the Council hope that the Acting Surveyor will find time to draw up some simple rules to regulate building of fire walls, and overcrowding, - for the early consideration of the incoming Council.

Budget 1877: Printed prop - copy of which had been sent to each member of Council on Saturday, is submitted and passed. —

Dues on Merchandise. Firms on French side. Mr. Leyville is sent for and questioned whether he has any means of discovering if goods passed through the Custom House by persons on the French side are landed at the wharves or portions on this Settlement; — in fact to mention two firms — Messrs Morris Co. and Schellhass & Co. — it was currently

reported that they stored goods at the Hongkew wharf for many days together.

Mr. Reyndell stated that he had no means of ascertaining. True, the agents of vessels from Foreign countries and the colonies which went to the wharf generally notified consignees of the cargo that it was being discharged into godowns at the wharf, and most of the coasting steamers landed and discharged at the wharf, but he knew that in many instances cargo belonging to persons on the French side was received over the side of the vessels and apparently did not touch the wharf at all - He was unable to distinguish from any information at present at his command between goods so treated and those landed or shipped at the wharf - The manager of the wharf might give the particulars if applied to. -

It is suggested by the meeting that the Agents of the Wharves be asked to afford the Council some assistance in this respect, and in the meantime accounts are to be rendered ^{to the Council} for dues on all goods imported or shipped by Meyer, Harris & Co. and Schilhart & Co. in vessels which berth at the wharf -

Dues on Native produce imported in Foreign Vessels - From 1st January 1877

Import dues are not to be charged on native produce or other goods in which the Assistant at the Dues Office has reason to believe the importers are interested solely as carriers - Such produce or goods on being re-exported by foreigners to be charged with re-export dues. Report to be made to the Council immediately any difficulty occurs in recovering such re-export dues. -

New Lekin Regulations. Consideration is given to Report from the Dept. of Police (No. 77) asking how the Police are to act in disputes arising from goods not being marked or stamped by the Chinese Authorities, - and to the remarks by the Watch Committee thereon -

The Council order that from and after the first day of the first month of the third year of Kwangsu (February 13th 1877) no Lekin Taxes shall be levied upon Foreign merchandise, imported by Foreign Merchants, and held within the limits of the Foreign Settlement of Shanghai, whether by foreigners or Chinese. -

Bales of Cotton. The conveyance of Bales of Cotton through the streets of the Settlement on wheelbarrows to be prohibited.

Shanghai Waterworks Co. - The boats of the Shanghai Waterworks Co., which
