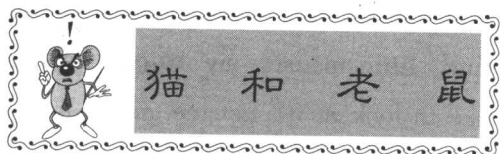

Cat and Mouse

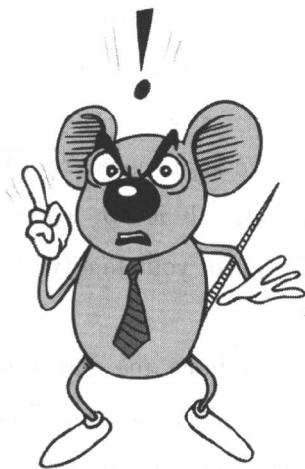

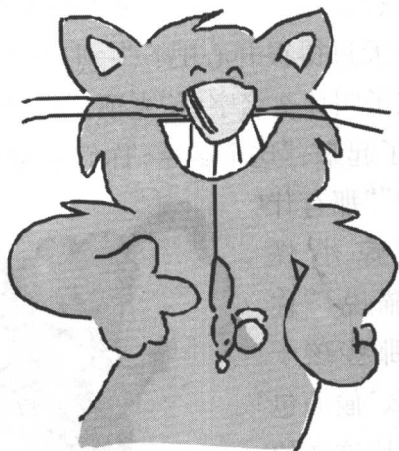
