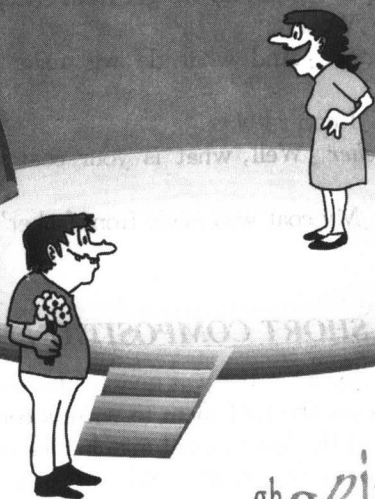

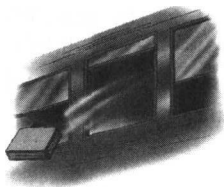
“这座位空吗？”绅士问道。

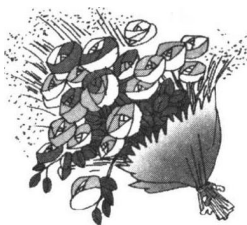

A boy who was cleaning shoes in the street said to a young man passing by: "Let me clean your boots."

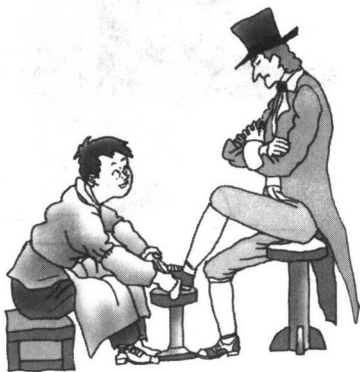
The young man said "No."
